








AG IN THE CLASSROOM FOCUSES ON FOOD SOURCING

PUMPKIN SEED SAVING ACTIVITY DELIGHTS GARDEN CLUB GROUP







Students enjoyed playing in pumpkin guts, spreading the seeds out to dry, and observing the high water line around their school following the hurricane.

POOP FAIRY CAMPAIGN ON DISPLAY AT HALLOWEEN EVENT

District Manager Kirsten Robertson and Admin Specialist Lainey Veltri took the district's message about keeping pet waste out of the storm drains to trick-or-treaters participating in the county's annual Halloween event. The team served Tootsie Rolls and other candy

bars (that, when unwrapped, resemble pet waste) while also reminding visitors about the importance of picking up after their pets to keep bacteria from washing into local waterways. Their tablescape featured fake poop, E. coli bacteria and a storm drain replica. The tablescape took second place in the contest!
