Stormwater Programs Coordinator Abbi Greer headed to J.L.



Mann High School's Biology 2 class to teach about stormwater pollution and environmental careers. Students learned about six stormwater pollutants and the effects each has on the environment.

Later, the students worked together to solve a water contamination mystery activity from Project WET (Water Education Today). Each group had to work together to triangulate the source of groundwater pollution and discuss



the potential challenges with remediation. This activity gave students a glimpse into one of many water-related careers they can pursue in their near futures.

- **Eight applications for streambank stabilization have been received** for use of state and federal funds through a grant with Natural Resources Conservation Service.


# >>> AGRICULTURE / FOOD SECURITY
