GARDENING WORKSHOP COVERS COMPOSTING AND RECYCLING

Haley Mumaw, District Programs Coordinator, hosted a library workshop titled "Upcycling and Your Garden" that included information about seed saving, composting and recycling household goods to be repurposed for your garden.

Participants learned the difference between heirloom and hybrid plants, common seed saving mistakes, and how to find the best composting system for your gar-



den. At the end of the workshop, participants went home with a packet of herb seeds curtesy of the Seed Library.

PARTICIPANTS MAKE RAIN BARRELS AND LEARN ABOUT PROPER USE



In partnership with Conestee Nature Preserve, GCSWCD staff

conducted two rain barrel construction and education workshops in March. Abigail Greer, Stormwater Programs Coordinator, gave a brief talk on the importance of responsibly using collected rainwater--no drinking! Conestee staff shared about the history of the preserve and its role as an important floodplain in the Greenville County watershed. Seventeen participants went home with completed rain barrels and best practice information about these water-saving devices!





TEAM LEARNS ABOUT WATER QUALITY MONITORING AT AAS TRAINING



This month, the GCSWCD education team traveled to Spartanburg to participate in Adopt-A-Stream volunteer training. The training, facilitated by SC Adopt-A-Stream volunteer coordinator Beth Foley, covered various aspects of water quality monitoring metrics such as pH, temperature and dissolved oxygen.

The education team enjoyed learning about this statewide citizen science program and especially loved getting their feet wet as they practiced their newly learned monitoring techniques.



HYDROLOGY WORKSHOP MAKES CONNECTION TO VIDEO GAME LANDSCAPES



Abbi Greer, GCSWCD's Stormwater Programs Coordinator, headed to the Berea Library to teach a workshop on the hydrology of various video game landscapes. Participants enjoyed discussing the possibility (or impossibility) of certain water features in beloved games such as Zelda and Minecraft. This workshop covered the basics of groundwater and surface water hydrology, addressed virtual examples of common water-formed features, and compared real versus rendered hy-

drological phenomena for accuracy. Soil and Water staff is thankful for all the opportunities the Greenville County Library System creates for conservation education.

CONSERVATION DISTRICTS DAY AT THE STATEHOUSE
